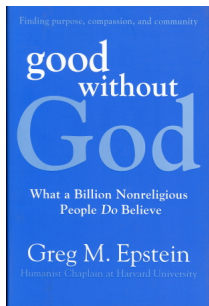


Good Without God: What a Billion Nonreligious People Do Believe
